Matthew 11: 25-28

In our gospel reading this week, Jesus identifies himself with Wisdom, and earlier in the chapter also takes it to himself to represent in himself the law in the Torah. God is revealed in the Bible and Jesus, as we know from John, is the *logos*, the word, that comes from God, in the flesh. So when Jesus talks about no-one knowing the Son except the Father and no-one knowing the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him, he is talking about the intimate relationship not only between the Father and the Son, but also between those who believe and God. It is within this framework that we can look again at the burden we carry when we come to God. The physical burdens of life, what brings us down, are healed in the presence of Jesus and the Father. The knowledge that we gain in the identification of ourselves with him is, in comparison, light and an easy burden to bear. It gives rest.

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
