Luke 10.1-9

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you."

Rector's Note

An old philosophical saying asks whether a tree makes a sound if it falls in a forest and no-one hears. This is about human experience and human perception, but also about the way the world works. It's a bit like the saying that a flap of a butterfly's wings somewhere can bring a whirlwind somewhere else. Jesus' warning in the 12th chapter vv1-7 of Luke's gospel, the reading for this morning, comes in two parts. The first is a warning: do not do in the dark what you would not do in the light. The second could be seen as part of the same thing but perhaps as a comfort. Even sparrows do not fall without being seen by

What we do, matters. It may not seem to, it may only be a tiny, insignificant thing, but it matters. A tree cannot fall unnoticed, there are always consequences to actions.

At present we are reaping the whirlwind of being connected as human beings. Normally a good thing, now we live with the threat of a potentially fatal disease simply by being together. What we do, matters. After all, COVID19 spreads because people do not always do what they should. The disease has spread because of the way we live now. with international travel, in close proximity to each other.

However, our responsibility as individuals does not change because of what others might do. We can ponder long and hard over the blameless people in Liverpool who have done all that they should and still face the highest transmission levels in the country this week. At its heart we still need to act as people who love, who are discipled into love by God, who not only sees all that we do but as Jesus says, rewards what is done in secret as well as what might be done in public.
