The View From Grabbist

March 2025

You may have observed that I find great inspiration from the natural world! I have meandered over the months through fungi, seasons, dead leaves and hilltop views. The natural world is *the* in-your-face reality which we cannot escape, whether in rural Exmoor or bustling Exeter. While she is utilised and misused in our vain human attempts to build permanence, Mother Nature relentlessly bursts through our folly. Even on the filthiest pavements, daisies and thistles peak out.

Pause ... and take a *breath*. Inhalation is your receiving of the finest gift. As you reciprocate, you offer back your exhaled air to the atmosphere. Really, there's no ultimate clear-cut distinction between 'atmosphere', 'you' and 'the environment' - we altogether *are* nature. When does the air become you? Am I too not 'the environment' for the trillions of microbiomes in my body which keep me alive? Does my toenail stop being me when I snip it off?there's no escape, we inter-are!

It is my belief that it is *all* holy, all of nature a sacrament accessible to our senses which shimmers with wonder, intricacy and intrigue, which unspeakably hints at the Divine, the fullness of Reality utterly beyond our senses.

Lest you think my specs are rose-tinted, it's not just the aspects of nature that delight us that are sacramental. Nature is indeed red in tooth and claw; as well as collaboration, there's competition, an inbuilt creative tension. Evolution's flow tinkles and sparkles delightfully like a mountain stream, yes, but it also creaks, cracks, crashes, weeps and roars with destructive force. These aspects too echo the Divine Mystery which is at once fierce and homely, fearful and gentle as a dove, utterly other yet intimate, and can be heard in the groan of creation '*waiting for the children of God to be revealed...*', a groan that resonates in our own heartaches and struggles as God's offspring (Rom 8.19-23).

In this light, I invite us this Lent to ponder the life of Jesus, his temptations, wrestles and passion just as much as the liberation, compassion and light that shines through his life. This Christ way is the embodied, fleshed-out, messy way of the cross, the way of death and new life, a pattern laced throughout the cosmos. Deep, silent contemplation of this way sits alongside wide-eyed beholding of nature. The two are intertwined. As the ultimate icon, Nature - if we dare allow her - points us beyond herself, by the impetus of the Divine Spirit who is her very life, to the Christ who upholds and indwells all, by the same Divine Spirit.

This is the Christ who beckons us to come home to the Heart of Love, to indwell all things in him - a fearful yet delightful path, the only authentic path there is. As St Augustine said, '*let us flee to our beloved homeland, for there the Father is, and there is everything*'.

Great, indeed, is the mystery of faith.
